

## **How to Cite and Reference Articles in the CAMFT *Compendium***

According to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, 6th Edition (2010), the CAMFT *Compendium* should be cited and referenced as an “Anthology or Collected Works.” By doing so, the citation is clearly marked, and the reference is easily sourced.

### **EXAMPLE:**

The following example is paraphrased from David Jensen’s article in this edition (January 2018) of the *Compendium* entitled, “Don’t Fumble the Information Concerning a Patient’s Risk of Suicide.” This article has appeared in several annual update publications of the *Compendium*.

### **Citation within the text of your paper:**

According to Jensen (2005/2018), there are many references to catastrophic outcomes where information of a patient’s suicide risk was fumbled when referring from one therapist to another. The author encourages extreme caution in this area as an error resulting in the death of a patient could easily cause one to be found liable for falling beneath the expected standard of care

### **In your References section:**

**NOTE:** Both the original publication year, and the *Compendium* publication year are noted within your text, as "Jensen (2005/2018)." In the References section entry, both publication years are noted, but are separated, with the *Compendium* year accompanying the author's name, and the year of the original work appearing at the end of the reference citation.
